This year's PAM Annual Dinner struck me as a very glitzy, classy, and glamorous event. The Organizing Committee did a good job paying heed to details when conceptualizing the theme and ambience for the gala evening.

The roll call on the guest list added to the glamour of the evening with the who's-who of the industry gracing our Dinner function.

The icing of the cake, was of course the PAM Awards 2010. To the architectural fraternity, this was our collective moment of pride, to see the winning Architects, step up to receive the recognition they justly deserved. And who can say if it is not these photo-framed moments that invisibly works

its magic on each one of us to soldier on with our own personal hopes and dreams thereby ensuring the way forward for the Profession as a whole!



This year also saw PAM giving recognition to past PAM Council Members. This honour, bestowed upon these members before their peers, demonstrates for me, the final coming of age of our fraternity. With this gracious and profound act, we have amply, but subtly, displayed our ability to transcend our past shortcomings in the greater interest of our shared destiny ahead. No doubt, when the curtains came down for that night, many would have left the hall feeling redeemed, or closure for some.

The two main speakers for the night were of course our own President. Ar. Boon Che Wee and the Guest of Honour, Yang Berhormat Dato' Shaziman bin Abu Mansor, Minister of Works.

On that evening, it was crystal clear to me that PAM was making a fervent plea to the Government to promote the design and creative industry, on a suitable platform that will enable its full manifestation on the Nation's GDP. The President's tone suggested there was a real urgency in this call. I believe, it was only after "R & D' became a catch phrase here in Malaysia in the late '70s and early '80s that the private and public sector paid attention to its value. As a result, R&D has enabled transformation of many economies that allowed businesses to continue to be relevant and profitable. In



the same token, although 'design' has been with us from our caveman ancestors, it is only when commerce applies it in a financial model that it becomes an economic blueprint for the Nation's capital growth. In this light, I see where the President is coming from. Our neighbours Japan, Korea and even Singapore already have a head start. We should not delay.

The President further suggests that, given its scale, Architecture should lead in the effort to promote the creative industry and transform it into an economic power-house.

To achieve this, we need to first establish Malaysian Architecture & Design as Premier Products in the Global Market.

We do this by participating and winning in International Design Competitions, taking part in International Design Events (such as the Prestigious Venice Architecture Biennale) and Expos, being innovative enough to garner space in International media reports, etc.

PAM believes the current Green Building Index has also presented opportunities to shift the creativity industry into higher gear. The application of 'green' to 'design' would further facilitate the global competitiveness of the local industry and both are potential high income economies.

At this point it is evident that the Government expects more export of services and is willing to assist the local firms to gear up in this direction. MARTRADE and other institutions continue to be at the forefront, working with Professional bodies to advance this effort. PAM wishes to strengthen such partnership and promote similar symbiotic set-up.

PAM also highlighted the latest industry-led initiatives for Green Building rating tools which will start ratings for township and neighbourhood development, ratings for industrial buildings (opportunities for Architects involved in industrial design and green retrofitting of existing buildings) and a version of the non-residential rating for retail malls.

PAM urged the Government to also ensure that more Local projects are awarded through competitions ensuring a level playing field based on merits. It is unfortunate that so many projects of national interest including those under GLCs and local multi-nationals are awarded to foreign firms when the talent is already available locally.

The President concluded his speech with the introduction of his team for the year 2010-2011 which included the Office Bearers and Council Members.

The Minister's speech touched on the Government's transformation programmes and the expanding roles of the Consultants in a new borderless world:-



Malaysia is headed to be a high income nation and this has already been set in motion by the 4 pillars of change:-

- i) 1 Malaysia (People First, Performance Now)
- ii) The Government Transformation Programme (GTP)
- iii) The Economic Transformation Programme (ETP)
- iv) The 10th Malaysian Plan (10 MP)

RM 230 billion has been allocated for infrastructure and development programmes and of this, RM 138 billion (60%) is for physical infrastructural development.

The consultatancy sector as a key player in the construction value chain is expected to be a principal driver to support this agenda of the 10th MP.

Green Building Technology will play a pivotal role to protect our environment while encouraging best practices in physical development. The consultants' roles will expand into these new fields, as we become custodians of our natural heritage.

To compliment PAM and ACEM's Green Building Index, the works Ministry, in collaboration with the Ministry of Energy, Water & Green Technology will be setting up the 'Joint-Council' to legislate nationally-recognized rating system of green infrastructural.

PAM was complimented for initiating open design competitions which will encourage innovation and creative excellence, especially among the younger practitioners.

To this it was added, that the Ministry applauded and supported PAM's vision on a New Design and Creative Economy. This should not only establish itself as an economy on its own, but also lend value to other industries in the national economy which can improve the nation's global competitiveness.

The Minister reminded all that with the forthcoming liberalization, Architects must:-

- i) strive for excellence, innovation and creativity
- ii) develop a definitive design character (specialist);
- iii) build capacity and establish networking;
- iv) stay informed on global directions (eg. Green Tech); and
- v) prepare to venture overseas (export of services).

The Minister acknowledged the important role of Architects in driving development in Malaysia and concluded by extending his congratulations to PAM for the successful organization of the dinner, to the PAM Design Award winners and to the recipients of the PAM Past Council Members Award.

PAM Awards 2010








Errata PAM AWARDS 2010 booklet







The 3 Stonor Architectural Ideas Competition was launched on 5 May 2010 and received 27 entries from PAM Corporate Members when it closed on 27 August 2010. It was organised by PAM with the sponsorship from PAM Education Fund (PEF) to demonstrate the process and outcome of a competition, and more importantly, to discover and showcase the design talent and creative skill of our members to add value to a strategic but challenging site.

First UIA Region IV (Asia and Oceania) 2010 International Symposium on the Conservation of Architectural Heritage - ICSAH 2010 — Xi'an, China

The inaugural UIA Region IV (Asia and Oceania) 2010 International Symposium on the Conservation of Architectural Heritage was hosted by the Xi'an University of Architecture and Technology from Wednesday 15th September 2010 until Saturday 18th September 2010.

A total of 20 delegates from the 25 member countries of Region IV were present at the event. PAM was represented by Ar. Mohd Zulhemlee bin An as a Committee Member in the UIA Work Program on Architectural Heritage of Region IV.

Member of PAM Heritage and Conservation Committee Ar Ahmad Najib bin Ariffin was invited to submit and present a Research Paper in the Symposium. The paper is titled "Rediscovering the Wisdom of Disappearing Traditional Malaysian Architecture — But Is It Too Late?" which he prepared together with Ar Mohd Zulhemlee bin An.

The event also included the Exhibition of Sample Cases on Architectural Heritage Conservation in the countries of Region IV. Malaysia's exhibition entry was researched and prepared also by Ar Ahmad Najib bin Ariffin, with assistance from the office of Ar Mohd Zulhemlee bin An.

The "Xi'an Consensus" was tabled and discussed in a meeting on the first day of the Symposium. The salient points of the Xi'an Consensus highlighted the richness of diversity of architectural heritage in the entire UIA Region IV and the importance of the Architect's role in the conservation and/or perpetuation of built heritage.

The members of UIA Region IV collectively have committed to preserve and protect the architectural heritage and to incorporate the values of cultural and regional architecture into new buildings as the member countries progress, so as to maintain and preserve the unique identities of the respective countries or areas, with a view to both environmental and cultural sustainability.

A total of 76 papers were chosen for acceptance, including Malaysia's. It was an honour for Malaysia's submitted Paper to be not only accepted but also listed as one of the Proceedings' first section entries and also one of the first/main session's papers to be presented on the first day. This ensured that there was a 'full house' in the conference hall during the presentation by Ar. Najib, supported by Ar Zaulhemlee. Judging from the number of people who approached Ar Najib after the presentation, it successfully elicited positive responses including requests for interviews.

In conjunction with the symposium, an exhibition with a total of 33 projects of participating countries' conservation works were exhibited during the event.

Our project submission was selected by the international jury









as one of the six best projects acknowledged to receive an award from the organizer. A UIA trophy and accompanying individual certificate was presented at the ICSAH Gala Night and Dinner Ceremony.

On the final day of the Symposium the delegates were taken on an educational tour of the Daming Palace Heritage Park, the Western market Museum and the Terra Cotta Warriors Museum.

HANDBOOK FOR PAM CONTRACT 2006

Contract disputes often arise as a result of a combination of disputable ambiguity in the contract documents, lack of understanding on the terms and conditions during administration of contracts as well as a less than careful preparation or alteration of documents. For architects and contract managers, administering a contract by relying on past experience and less than thorough understanding of the clauses is no longer sufficient. There are issues like statutory position, legal precedence, appropriateness of context and procedural protocols, not to mention evolving statutory provisions to contend with.

In Malaysia, although the PAM Forms are the de facto private industry standard forms of contract, most users also use or are exposed to other forms of contract. Feedback collected during the workshops to introduce the PAM 2006 Forms to the industry indicated that there was a great need to highlight the differences between these forms, and given the diverse nature of the information sources, there are areas of confusion among users that needed clarification, especially with regards to applying that knowledge when using PAM 2006 forms.

This Handbook for PAM Contract 2006 was written by the authors of PAM 2006 suite of contracts to address these needs. PAM President Ar. Boon

Che Wee in his Foreword to the Handbook said: "Drawing on their combined expertise gained in pursuit of their careers as active practitioners, the authors of this handbook explain all clauses succinctly and when necessary, with reference to relevant case law decisions, illustrate the legal principles that have been used to shape PAM 2006. Written in a style that has come to characterize their collaborative authorship, the narrative, including the cases cited and their interpretations are readily understood, and regardless of the complexity of the subject matter, the writing remains clear and easy to follow."
